Is your street interested in throwing a block party? Not sure what you need to do? Let's cover the basics. Block parties can be a great way to meet your neighbors, build relationships and have fun. Where should you start?

- 1. Pick a date, get a few organizers together and delegate duties. Pick 2-3 dates and ask your neighbors what dates they can attend, to maximize participation. Pick a theme, have name tags you may know everyone but not all your neighbors know one another.
- 2. Block off the street to be safe you will need to get a block party application approved by the GPPD. Visit gptx.org and search for Block party application, you will need this form to have your street blocked off. The concern of accident liability has many steering clear of allowing the BBQ grill or bounce house on their property. How to handle this worry? One source said they have homeowners sign a waiver to protect homeowners and reduce potential neighborhood tension.
- 3. What to eat? BBQing, catering, potluck so many options, manning the grill and enjoying a beverage is my favorite, whatever your street decides, make sure everyone is on board, maybe a few neighbors want their entrée catered and others want to cook, go for it. The intent is to mingle and enjoy each other. Many neighborhoods opt for each family to bring their own beverages (although some will provide soft drinks) and often ask every family to donate a set amount to offset the cost of the meat, prizes for the kiddies and entertainment.
- 4. Entertainment, DJ's, block rockers, garage-stereos, bounce houses, bean-bag toss, washers, face paintings, snow cones, sack races, make it fun! Come up with games for all ages, maybe get a street block party trophy, for the winner. Have a pie eating contest, or egg toss (please clean the street if you do) water balloon toss for the kids or adults. There are way too many ideas to list, talk to your neighbors and see what they like.
- 5. Other ideas, Ask the local police and fire department if they would stop by for a mini hands on seminar for the kids. Have a bike decorating contest, chili cook off, or live entertainment.
- 6. Have a plan, be safe, have sunscreen, first aid kits, water and shade available. If you're going to have alcohol be safe. Don't try and ride a mini dirt bike with a fire-works mortar launcher duct-taped to a helmet and shoot off fire-works while popping a wheelie! Let's have the neighbors talking about what a great time they had and not telling the story of how the fire depart showed up.
- 7. Clean up! Nothing is worse than being the neighbor that didn't help, if you played help clean up. Designate a house for trash. Make sure you have bags, and containers out for trash and recyclables.

Traffic was a little bad he said and asked if I wanted to go again, I was in. we got on the road and traffic, half an hour later traffic, an hour we started to question it, three hours later we made it to the track, we watched the final race and drove home.... No traffic. See for me it didn't matter how late we were I just spent 5 hours in the car with my dad, I got to sit up front and he didn't treat me like a kid. I got to adjust the radio, sing the lyrics out loud with him to the songs I knew, If I was hot I could roll my window down. We talked about racing we didn't worry about the fact that it took us 3 hours to drive 35 miles, we enjoyed the time together. I'll never forget that time, and my dad and I still talk about it 25 years later. Making memories and being there for me was always my dad's greatest accomplishment.

Juneteenth a history in the United States and Texas

On June 19 ("Juneteenth"), 1865, Union general Gordon Granger arrived in Galveston and issued General Order Number 3, which read, "The people of Texas are informed that, in accordance with a proclamation from the Executive of the United States, all slaves are free. This involves an absolute equality of personal rights and rights of property between former masters and slaves, and the connection heretofore existing between them becomes that between employer and hired labor. The freed are advised to remain at their present homes, and work for wages. They are informed that they will not be allowed to collect at military posts; and that they will not be supported in idleness either there or elsewhere." The tidings of freedom reached the approximately 250,000 slaves in Texas gradually as individual plantation owners informed their slaves over the months following the end of the war. The news elicited an array of personal celebrations, some of which have been described in The Slave Narratives of Texas (1974). The first broader celebrations of Juneteenth were used as political rallies and to teach freed African American about their voting rights. Within a short time, however, Juneteenth was marked by festivities throughout the state, some of which were organized by official Juneteenth committees.

June 19, 1865 announcement of the abolition of slavery in Texas, and more generally the emancipation of African-American slaves throughout the Confederate South. Celebrated on June 19, the word is a combination of "June" and "nineteenth". Juneteenth is recognized as a state holiday or special day of observance in most states.

In 1980, Texas was the first state to establish Juneteenth as a state holiday under legislation introduced by freshman Democratic state representative Al Edwards. Juneteenth is a "skeleton crew" day in the state; government offices do not close but agencies may operate with reduced staff.

By 2008, nearly half of US states observed the holiday as a ceremonial observance. As of May 2016, when the Maryland legislature approved official recognition of the holiday, 45 of the 50 U.S. states and the District of Columbia have recognized Juneteenth as either a state holiday or ceremonial holiday, a day of observance. States that do not recognize it are Hawaii, Montana, New Hampshire, North Dakota and South Dakota.

In 1996, the first legislation to recognize "Juneteenth Independence Day" was introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives, H.J. Res. 195, sponsored by Barbara-Rose Collins (D-MI). In 1997 Congress recognized the day through Senate Joint Resolution 11 and House Joint Resolution 56. In 2013, the U.S. Senate passed Senate Resolution 175, acknowledging Lula Briggs Galloway (late president of the National Association of Juneteenth Lineage) who "successfully worked to bring national recognition to Juneteenth Independence Day", and the continued leadership of the National Juneteenth Observance Foundation.

We can celebrate locally in Grand Prairie with a parade that begins at Grand Prairie City Hall Plaza and continues to Tyre Park. The parade is followed by free food, music and entertainment. Hope to see you there.



HOA POOL RULES

- **NO LIFEGUARD** on duty. Swim at your own risk. 1.
- Children under the age of 14 MUST be accompanied by a resident, 18 years or 2. older, possessing a valid pool card.
- 3. Only 4 guests allowed per residence. A resident, 18 years or older, possessing a valid pool card, MUST accompany all guests.
- Proper swimwear required. 4.
- Persons with skin diseases, open sores or wounds, inflamed eyes, nasal or ear 5. infections or any communicable diseases are not allowed to use the pool.
- 6. For the health and safety of the residents, rubber pants in addition to swim diapers are REQUIRED for all non-toilet trained children.
- NO water wings allowed without a **U.S. Coast Guard approved life vest**, properly fitted with age and with adult supervision. NO rafts allowed.
- 8. NO diving allowed.
- NO pets, NO smoking, NO alcohol or glass objects of any kind allowed in pool area. NO food or drink allowed in the pool water.
- 10. Radios and other noise should be maintained at a low level at all times.
- 11. DO NOT ride bikes, tricycles, scooters, roller blades, skateboards, or any other similar vehicle in the pool area.
- 12. Running, roughhousing or general horseplay that may endanger the safety of others is NOT allowed.
- 13. Foul language and/or threatening behavior will NOT be tolerated.
- 14. Emergency equipment is to be used for emergencies only.
- 15. Access to the equipment room is restricted.
- 16. NO trespassing after pool hours or during pool closures.
- 17. The Homeowners Association or Management Company is not responsible for personal property, accidents, injuries or theft.
- 18. **VANDALISM WILL NOT BE TOLERATED.** To report vandalism, call police immediately, then notify Management Company 817-473-6787.
- 19. Pools WILL CLOSE during inclement weather.
- 20. In case of EMERGENCY, CALL 911.

Violation of pool rules may lead to revoking of pool privileges and/or criminal prosecution.

Recipes of the Month

Chamomile-Strawberry-Orange Cold-Brewed Tea

Ingredients

- 8 chamomile tea bags
- 12 cups filtered water, at room temperature
- 2 small juice oranges (thin-skinned), peeled, cut into slices, and seeded
- 24 large strawberries, halved
- 4 teaspoons honey
- 4 teaspoons hot water

How to Make It

- 1. Place 1 tea bag and 1 1/2 cups water in each of 8 pint-size canning jars with lids. Place 2 orange slices and 6 strawberry halves in each jar. Cover with lids; refrigerate 12 to 24 hours.
- 2. Remove tea bags from jars. Combine honey and 4 teaspoons hot water. Divide honey mixture evenly among jars (about 1 scant teaspoon in each).

Chicken and White Bean Salad with Citrus Vinaigrette

Ingredients

- 3 tablespoons fresh orange juice
- 2 tablespoons white wine vinegar
- 2 teaspoons country Dijon mustard
- 2 teaspoons honey
- 2 tablespoons minced shallot
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- 1/2 cup olive oil
- 3 cups chopped cooked chicken
- 1 (15.5-oz.) can cannellini beans, rinsed and drained
- 1 (6-oz.) bag microwave steam-in-bag snow peas, steamed according to package directions and sliced into 1-inch pieces
- 3 cups shredded purple cabbage
- 2 oranges, sectioned
- 6 tablespoons roasted sliced almonds with salt

How to Make It

- 1. Whisk together orange juice, vinegar, Dijon mustard, honey, shallot, salt, and pepper in a large bowl; slowly whisk in olive oil.
- 2. Add the chicken, cannellini beans, snow peas, purple cabbage, and oranges to the bowl. Toss the salad in the dressing until all the ingredients are thoroughly coated. Divide salad among 6 plates, and top each plate with 1 Tbsp. sliced almonds.





Flag Day

In the United States, Flag Day is celebrated on June 14. It commemorates the adoption of the flag of the United States, which happened on June 14, 1777, by resolution of the Second Continental Congress.[1] The United States Army also celebrates the U.S. Army Birthdays on this date; Congress adopted "the American continental army" after reaching a consensus position in the Committee of the Whole on June 14, 1775

The week of June 14 June 11–17, 2017 is designated as "National Flag Week." During National Flag Week, the president will issue a proclamation urging U.S. citizens to fly the American flag for the duration of that week. The flag should also be displayed on all government buildings. Some organizations, hold parades and events in celebration of America's national flag and everything it represents.

If you are interested in putting a flag pole or attaching a flag holder to your house please request an ACC approval before doing so. Mira Lagos will proudly support the flying of the American Flag in our community.

Painting Problem Tricks to Try

Are you a messy painter and usually have more paint on your hands and arms than the project? Try spraying your uncovered skin with cooking spray before you begin your project for easy cleaning without scrubbing. You can also use solid vegetable shortening after painting. Both techniques will work if using latex or oil based paint.

Do paint smells bother you? Try adding a tablespoon of vanilla extract per gallon to any type paint which can help to neutralize strong smells. The extract will not affect the color of the paint.

Painting metal or plastic surfaces? To help paint adhere better to metal and keep it from cracking, rub a sponge dampened with vinegar on the metal surface before painting. For plastic surfaces, rub the plastic with a used fabric softener sheet.

Have white paint and want to add color? Try slowly adding a pack or portion of 'unsweetened' powered drink mix into the white paint until the desired color is reached.

Spill paint on the carpet? Before calling a professional carpet cleaner, try to remove as much paint with a paper towel as possible and then cover the spill with white flour which absorbs the paint helping for an easier clean up.



Grand Prairie Snap & Send!



Grand Prairie residents using the city's new "Snap and Send" app can now report issues, such as street light outages and code violations, using their smartphones. The app, currently compatible with iPhone, iPad and iPod touch, allows users to specify the location of an issue and attach a photo to send directly to city staff as well as track the status of their service requests.

Search "Snap and Send Grand Prairie TX" in the Apple App Store and download for free. The city plans to make the app available for Android users in the future.

Residents can also report issues directly through the city's website at gptx.org/report or call city offices at 972-237-8000.



1. Know thy airport.

Take a look at the airport's website and terminal map to get an idea ahead of time of things such as your eating options, the locations of family restrooms, and the availability of kids' play areas for children to work off some energy.
