On July 19, 1910, the governor of the U.S. state of Washington proclaimed the nation's first "Father's Day." However, it was not until 1972, 58 years later, that Father's Day became an official, nationwide holiday in the United States.

On July 5, 1908, a West Virginia church sponsored the nation's first event explicitly in honor of fathers, a Sunday sermon in memory of the 362 men who had died in the previous December's explosions at the Fairmont Coal Company mines in Monongah, but it was a one-time commemoration and not an annual holiday. The next year, a Spokane, Washington woman named Sonora Smart Dodd, one of six children raised by a widower, tried to establish an official equivalent to Mother's Day for male parents. She went to local churches, the YMCA, shopkeepers and government officials to drum up support for her idea, and she was successful: Washington State celebrated the nation's first statewide Father's Day on July 19, 1910. Slowly, the holiday spread.

In 1916, President Wilson honored the day by using telegraph signals to unfurl a flag in Spokane when he pressed a button in Washington, D.C. In 1924, President Calvin Coolidge urged state governments to observe Father's Day. However,

many men continued to disdain the day. As one historian writes, they "scoffed at the holiday's sentimental attempts to domesticate manliness with flowers and gift-giving, or they derided the proliferation of such holidays as a commercial gimmick to sell more products-often paid for by the father himself."

In 1972, in the middle of a hard-fought presidential re-election campaign, Richard Nixon signed a proclamation making Father's Day a federal holiday at last. Today, economists estimate that Americans spend more than \$1 billion each year on Father's Day gifts.

Flag Day, also called National Flag Day, in the United States, a day honoring the national flag, observed on June 14. The holiday commemorates the date in 1777 when the United States approved the design for its first national flag.

The idea to set aside a day to honor the national flag came from several sources. Bernard J. Cigrand, a

Wisconsin schoolteacher, in 1885 urged his students to observe June 14 as "Flag Birthday." He later wrote an essay published in a Chicago newspaper that urged Americans to proclaim this date as the day to celebrate the flag. In 1888 William T. Kerr of Pennsylvania founded the American Flag Day Association of Western Pennsylvania, an organization to which he dedicated his life. A lesser-known claim is that of George Morris of Connecticut, who is said to have organized the first formal celebration of the day in Hartford in 1861.

In 1916 Pres. Woodrow Wilson proclaimed June 14 as the official date for Flag Day, and in 1949 the U.S. Congress permanently established the date as National Flag Day. Although Flag Day is not an official federal holiday, Pennsylvania celebrates the day as a state holiday. Each year the U.S. president delivers an address that proclaims the week of June 14 as National Flag Week, and all Americans are encouraged to fly U.S. flags during that week. http://www.britannica.com

Tips to prepare for the summer storm season

When does severe weather season start in North Texas, and how long does it last?

Tornadoes and severe weather can occur almost any time of the year in North Texas. However, there are two predominant tornado seasons in our area. One occurs in the Spring and early Summer. Another probable season for tornadoes is in the Fall. Regardless of the time of year, people should be vigilant about paying attention to the weather forecasts.

What types of severe weather or disasters could we face in North Texas?

North Texas is plagued with almost every type of severe weather and disaster. Besides tornadoes and fierce winds, there is also the possibility of hail, lightning, flooding, ice storms, winter storms, wild fires, excessive heat and drought. Even small earthquakes must be taken into account in light of recent seismic activity in this region. North Texas may also experience technological hazards including industrial explosions, power grid failures and hazardous materials spills. Other emergencies or disasters may include train derailments, vehicle pileups, and plane crashes. As we have seen recently, riots, acts of violence and terrorist attacks cannot be ignored either.

Are there steps those who live in houses should take?

People in houses should know how to shut off water and gas utilities in case a disaster occurs. Everyone should make sure their home, apartment and belongings are insured.

What are specific items for an emergency kit?

There are necessary supplies you should have on hand to ensure you have sufficient

resources that might be needed in case of an emergency. This may include a fire extinguisher, smoke detector, NOAA weather radio, first aid kit, flashlight and batteries, matches and candles, extra clothing or blankets, medicines and prescriptions, diapers and baby formula, and food and water. Be sure to prepare emergency kits for your home and your vehicle too.

In the event of a disaster, technology we are used to -- such as the internet or smart phones -- may not be available. How can we stay informed and communicate with family and friends?

Technology may not always work in or after a disaster. This may include electricity, the internet or phones. You will need to find a way to provide lighting, stay warm or cool, obtain information and communicate with others. It is imperative to have flashlights, blankets and a battery or crank operated radio. Also, it is important to remember that it is often better to text in a disaster rather than make phone calls (since texts use less data than phone calls). Finding ways to communicate with family and friends who are out of state is advisable.

National Donut Day 2015

National Donut Day is on the first Friday of June each year. This year it's on Friday, June 5. It was created by The Salvation Army in 1938 to honor those who served donuts to soldiers during World War I. Many donut shops like to celebrate this day by giving away free donuts. Make sure to check with your favorite donut place!



Do you know what Juneteenth is?

It is the name for a holiday celebrating June 19, 1865, the day when Union soldiers arrived in Texas and spread the word that President Lincoln had delivered his Emancipation Proclamation. News traveled so slowly in those days that Texas did not hear of Lincoln's Proclamation, which he gave on January 1, 1863, until more than two years after it was issued!

The proclamation declared "that all persons held as slaves" within the rebellious states "are, and henceforward shall be free." Thus, the Emancipation Proclamation was limited in many ways. It applied only to states that had seceded from the Union, leaving slavery untouched in the loyal Border States. It also expressly exempted parts of the Confederacy that had already come under Northern control. Most important, the freedom it promised depended upon Union military victory.

Although Juneteenth has been informally celebrated each year since 1865, it wasn't until June 3, 1979, that Texas became the first state to proclaim Emancipation Day (Juneteenth) an official state holiday. But it is much more than a holiday. Juneteenth has become a day for African Americans to celebrate their freedom, culture, and achievements. It is a day for all Americans to celebrate African American history and rejoice in their freedom.

In June 2005, the House of Representatives unanimously adopted H. Con. Res. 71, sponsored by Congresswoman Barbara Lee, recognizing the significance of Caribbean people and their descendants in the history and culture of the United States. On February 14, 2006, the resolution similarly passed the Senate, culminating a two-year, bipartisan and bicameral effort.

Since the declaration, the White House has issued an annual proclamation recognizing June as Caribbean-American Heritage Month. This year marks the eighth anniversary of June as National Caribbean American Heritage Month.

The campaign to designate June as National Caribbean American Heritage Month, was spearheaded by Dr. Claire Nelson, Founder and President of the Institute of Caribbean Studies. Through the commemoration of this month, America is reminded that its greatness lies in its diversity, with Caribbean immigrants from founding father Alexander Hamilton, to journalist Malcolm Gladwell, who have shaped the American dream.

The 5th Annual Womens' Self-Defense Clinic a Hit!

On Thursday, April 23 the Mira Lagos HOA Safety Committee hosted the 5th Annual Womens' Self-defense clinic at Anna May Daulton Elementary School. Twelve residents learned fundamental principles of self-defense and several applications.

"This is what I call the ABC's of self-defense," stated instructor, Robert McLain. "Avoid whenever possible, when not possible Block an incoming attack, then Counter-attack to stop the aggression."

Students started by practicing avoiding different directions using footwork, twisting and body shifting to avoid attacks. They were introduced the importance of keeping proper distance from the intended attacker while maintaining eye contact. Next was the introduction of "natural body motions" to execute strikes, kicks, and throws. After working on these fundamentals, participants paired up with a training partner and worked on application of the self-defense techniques. The attacking partner moved with various attacks while the defending partner used the recently-learned skills. Assisted by Chayon-Ryu 2nd degree black belt, Doug Stevens, participants spent 1 ½ hours of their evening working together to improve their abilities.

The teaching method used during the class is Chayon-Ryu, which means, "Natural Way." It emphasizes natural body motions such as walking, running, twisting and skipping (among others) to teach martial arts movements. The system was founded by Grandmaster Kim Soo in 1968 following his immigration to the United States. Kim, a native of South Korea, grew up learning a combination of karate, chuan-fa and yudo in the 1950's, then Hapkido in the 1960's. He discovered that all styles share the commonality of "natural body movements" combined with fundamental principles of rhythm, balance of movements, proper breathing, among others. Kim has operated schools in Houston, Texas since 1968 and been faculty member teaching his unique teaching method as faculty at the University of Houston and Rice University for many of those years. In Houston, January 16 has been recognized by several Mayors as "Grandmaster Kim Soo Day," celebrating his contributions to the city. Mira Lagos resident and co-chair of the Safety Committee, Robert McLain, has operated the Arlington, Texas branch of Chayon-Ryu since 1994 and is ranked as a 5th degree black belt under Grandmaster Kim. He has been a correspondent to Black Belt Magazine, Taekwondo Times, and Totally Taekwondo Magazine for 15 years.
