





During the storms of May, numerous Flash Flood emergencies left many drivers stranded, caused highway closings, park closings and lake closings. Dozens of families were forced to evacuate their homes. At press, there were 23 deaths and 13 reported missing, state-wide. The storms also brought out critters from their normal habitat. Neighbors have reported seeing snakes as long as five-feet. Huge spiders and other pesky insects were also spotted. According to the Farmer's Almanac, Dallas-Fort Worth has set a record for the wettest May in history. The previous record was set in 1982 at 13.66 inches. However the 13.87 inches we received, puts us in the forefront of rainfall. However, we have since topped that number, reaching 16.07 inches. According to The National Weather Service in Fort Worth, 16 inches of rainfall amounts to more than 35 trillion gallons of rain. At Joe Pool Lake, water reached 12 and a half feet above normal levels. As a result, the lake and adjacent parks, Lynn Creek and Lloyd, closed its gates to allow the Corps of Engineers get the water under control. Lynn Creek Park will not be hosting its annual Fireworks Show on the 4th. You may consider attending the Lone Stars and Stripes celebration at Lone Star Park, instead. There will be a family fun park, live music, a few horse races and of course, fireworks...all right here in Grand Prairie! Gates open at 3:00 p.m. For more information, call 972-263-7223.

July is National Ice Cream Month

Recipe of the Month

Ice Cream Cake

1/2 gallon chocolate ice cream, softened 1 (18.25 ounce) package chocolate cake mix

Directions

- 1. Prepare cake according to package directions; bake in a 9x13 inch baking dish and cool completely.
- 2. Use ice cream that comes in a rectangular carton. Remove the carton and, using a piece of string or dental floss, cut the ice cream in half lengthwise (long side to long side) and place the two layers side by side on a piece of waxed paper.
- 3. Place the cooled cake over the



ice cream. Trim the cake and ice cream so that the edges match.

- 4. Place a board or serving platter over the cake, hold onto the waxed paper and board, and flip the ice cream cake over. Remove the waxed paper and smooth out the seam between the ice cream slabs.
- 5. Cover with waxed paper and freeze until very firm. Decorate as desired.

There are so many pros when it comes to spray paint. Just to name a few, spray paint provides more coverage (with no brush strokes) and dries much faster than paint out of a can. It is oil based, and adheres really well to almost anything, and it's much more durable than latex paint.

And of course the best part about spray paint...it's easy and fast, and there's barely any cleanup.

Spray paint is super versatile and can be used on tons of different surfaces, for example: wood, plastic, metal, fiberglass, tin, ceramic, mirror, glass, masonry, plaster, concrete, terra cotta, canvas, MDF, laminate, and particle board.

Spray painting is pretty easy, but here are the basics to get you started.

- 1. Go outside in a well-ventilated area. Wear a paint respirator.
- 2. Shake the spray paint can for a few minutes.
- 3. Aim the can away from the item you're painting, push down the nozzle, and start the stream of spray paint. The first spray out of the can usually spatters and you won't want that spatter on your item.
- 4. Move the stream of paint onto your item, keeping it about 6-8



inches away, and move back and forth in a smooth, rapid motion, spraying it from every angle. When spray painting outside, put items on a big piece of cardboard that can rotate without having to touch the item.

5. Apply 2-3 very light coats of spray paint, allowing each coat to completely dry in between. If you apply the paint too heavy, it will

drip. If you don't allow the coats to dry in between, the paint will bubble. So, just remember...several light coats + allowing paint to fully dry in between coats = perfect paint job.

Using spray paint is so easy, even a six year old can do it. Just take a look at the great work Jaxson Delci did on her lemonade stand.



Code Enforcement

The City of Grand Prairie Code Services department is responsible for handling city code violations. The city is divided into 10 districts, or areas, each of which has one officer assigned to handle all violations within that district.


You can now file code complaints online, as well as check on the status of existing cases with the City of Grand Prairie's new E-Code Enforcement services. Click on File a Complaint to submit a complaint form online. Click on Code Complaint Inquiry to check for existing cases at specific addresses and locations, view violations, inspection results, previous actions and pending actions.

Abatement of code violations, in some cases, may take several days or even weeks. The City must first notify the property owner of the violation by certified letter. In most cases, the property owner (or tenant) has 10 days to resolve the violation. If the violation remains after 10 days, the city issues a citation and fine. For tall grass, the city will contract with a company to mow the area, fining the owner and placing a lien on the property. For other violations, citations and fines continue to be issued until the problem is cured. Only in extreme cases will the city go in and clear the property of the violation if it presents a public health and safety hazard.

Independence Day

Variously known as the Fourth of July and Independence Day, July 4th has been a federal holiday in the United States since 1941, but the tradition of Independence Day celebrations goes back to the 18th century and the American Revolution (1775-83). In June 1776, representatives of the 13 colonies then fighting in the revolutionary struggle weighed a resolution that would declare their independence from Great Britain. On July 2nd, the Continental Congress voted in favor of independence, and two days later its delegates adopted the Declaration of Independence, a historic document drafted by Thomas Jefferson. From 1776 until the present day, July 4th has been celebrated as the birth of American independence, with typical festivities ranging from fireworks, parades and concerts to more casual family gatherings and barbecues.

The tradition of patriotic celebration became even more widespread after the War of 1812, in which the United States again faced Great Britain. In 1870, the U.S. Congress made July 4th a federal holiday; in 1941, the provision was expanded to grant a paid holiday to all federal employees. Over the years, the political importance of the holiday would decline, but Independence Day remained an important national holiday and a symbol of patriotism.

Falling in mid-summer, the Fourth of July has since the late 19th century become a major focus of leisure activities and a common occasion for family get-togethers, often involving fireworks and outdoor barbecues. The most common symbol of the holiday is the American flag, and a common musical accompaniment is "The Star-Spangled Banner," the national anthem of the United States.

Her own husband David, is a survivor of the Cambodia genocide, who, at the time was only four years old. He was starved, separated from his mother and lost many of his family members; eventually being reunited with his mother.

The family just returned from a special visit to Florida where Jessica's father and grandfather (a Korean War Medal of Honor recipient) both live.

The Environmental Quality Division conducts inspections of all food service establishments in the city. These inspections are unannounced and performed at regular intervals throughout the year based on risk levels. For example a low risk level facility, such as a grocery store, is inspected once a year. A high risk level facility, such as a nursing home cafeteria, is inspected 3 times a year. Most food services, like fast food restaurants, are inspected twice a year.

Each food facility is inspected and scored on a demerit/point system based on the type of violation the inspector witnesses. The fewer the

violations, the lower the demerit accumulation, zero is a perfect score. There are 28 items on the Inspection Form from which demerits are given. Some items, such as not keeping food at the right temperatures, have higher demerits. The final score provides a total of the demerits. The deficiencies are classified as either critical or non-critical.

Critical Violations - Violations that present a potential or immediate health hazard. These violations directly involve food hazards, such as contamination, or temperature violations. Whenever possible, critical violations found during the inspection are to be corrected immediately. Examples of critical violations include temperature abuse of food, improper cooking, cooling, refrigeration or reheating temperatures. Other critical violations are improper handwashing, using bare hands on "ready to eat" food, and poor hygienic practices. Such problems can create environments that cause bacteria to grow

and thrive, which put the consumers at risk for food-borne illness.

Non-Critical Violations - Violations that present minimal health risk. These items are not directly related to the cause of food-borne illnesses, but if left uncorrected, could impede the safe operation of the restaurant. Non-Critical violations, if left uncorrected, could lead to critical violations. Examples of non-critical violations include a lack of facility cleanliness and maintenance (floors, walls and ceilings). Non-critical violations do not warrant a demerit, however, the violation must be cor-

rected within a reasonable amount of time.

A food establishment fails if it receives more than 31 demerits. At that time, the Environmental Quality Division will close down the establishment. To re-open, a follow up inspection is required to ensure compliance with minimum food safety standards, and the establishment will be allowed to continue doing business only after all deficiencies have been corrected. However, a food establishment's original score will remain on this webpage until the next routine Health Inspection is performed.
