HISTORYOF LASSIDAY

Labor Day, an annual celebration of workers and their achievements, originated during one of American labor history's most dismal chapters. In the late 1800s, at the height of the Industrial Revolution in the United States, the average American worked 12-hour days and seven-day weeks in order to eke out a basic living. Despite restrictions in some states, children as young as 5 or 6 toiled in mills, factories and mines across the country, earning a fraction of their adult counterparts' wages. People of all ages, particularly the very poor and recent immigrants, often faced extremely unsafe working conditions, with insufficient access to fresh air, sanitary facilities and breaks.

Observed on the first Monday in September, Labor Day pays tribute to the contributions and achievements of American workers. It was created by the labor movement in the late 19th century and became a federal holiday in 1894. Labor Day also symbolizes the end of summer for many Americans, and is celebrated with parties, parades and athletic events. www.history.com

HISPANIC HERITAGE MONTH

During National Hispanic Heritage Month (September 15 to October 15) we recognize the contributions made and the important presence of Hispanic and Latino Americans to the United States and celebrate their heritage and culture.

Hispanics have had a profound and positive influence on our country through their strong commitment to family, faith, hard work, and service. They have enhanced and shaped our national character with centuriesold traditions that reflect the multiethnic and multicultural customs of their community. Hispanic Heritage Month, whose roots go back to 1968, begins each year on September 15, the anniversary of independence of five Latin American countries: Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua. Mexico, Chile and Belize also celebrate their independence days during this period and Columbus Day (Día de la Raza) is October 12.

The term Hispanic or Latino, refers to Puerto Rican, South or Central American, or other Spanish culture or origin regardless of race. On the 2010 Census form, people of Spanish, Hispanic and/or Latino origin could identify themselves as Mexican, Mexican American, Chicano, Puerto Rican, Cuban, or "another Hispanic, Latino, or Spanish origin."

According to this Census, 50.5 million people or 16% of the population are of Hispanic or Latino origin. This represents a significant increase from 2000, which registered the Hispanic population at 35.3 million or 13% of the total U.S. population.

Grand Prairie West Nile Virus Statistics



In 2014, Grand Prairie reported 11 mosquito West Nile cases and no human cases.

In an effort to manage the mosquito population and educate the public on this serious issue, the City of Grand Prairie takes the following measures:

- Ground sprays in response to positive human and mosquito positives in the City
- Surveys the areas where positives have been found
- Crews have surveyed and are continuing to survey low lying areas for standing water. When possible mosquito habitat is found, larvicide is applied
- Applied larvicide to over 20 areas throughout the city
- Provides post cards and door hangers to residents with pools
- · Inspects pools on complaints and at known vacant residences
- Provides information to vulnerable populations

Mosquito season started early in 2015 and so did the City's annual Fight the Bite campaign. Grand Prairie has trapped mosquitoes since April 1, 2015. The City has 44 trap locations and collects from 25-30 traps weekly. www.gptx.org

Childcare in Grand Prairie



Childcare in Grand Prairie is available through 50 commercial and church associated day care centers and approximately 74 registered childcare homes. The City also has several After-school programs including the YMCA, two

Boys and Girls Clubs (http://www.bgcarltx.org), and two Girls, Inc. of Tarrant County (www.girlsinctarrant.org). All facilities must be permitted through the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services (http://www.dfps.state.tx.us/).

In addition to state regulations, all childcare providers in Grand Prairie are required to be permitted by the City of Grand Prairie.

The City requires a valid permit issued by the Environmental Quality Division to childcare centers and anyone keeping unrelated children in their homes. The purpose of the permit requirement is to ensure the health, safety, and well being of children in the day care setting. The Environmental Quality Division conducts at least two unannounced inspections a year to ensure compliance with health, safety, and security provisions of the City of Grand Prairie Ordinance.

Current Water Restrictions

The following restrictions are in effect in the city of Grand Prairie:

- No watering on Wednesday, Saturday or Sunday.
- Even Numbered addresses may water on Mondays and Thursdays.
- Odd numbered addresses may water on Tuesday and Fridays.
- Handheld and soaker hoses are allowed to be used any time.
- *The following restrictions also apply at all times:

Residents and business are prohibited from watering their lawns anytime between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. When watering, a constant stream of water should not be allowed to flow into the street drainage.

Watering during precipitation is prohibited. Rain sensors are required on newer watering systems.

Recipe of the Month - Chicken Enchiladas

Ingredients

Original recipe makes 36 servings 4 skinless, boneless chicken breast halves - cooked and shredded 1 (8 ounce) jar picante sauce 1/4 teaspoon ground cumin 8 ounces shredded Monterey Jack cheese 8 ounces shredded Cheddar cheese 36 (6 inch) corn tortillas 1 tablespoon vegetable oil

Directions

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). In a medium bowl combine the shredded chicken, picante sauce and ground cumin. Mix together.

In a small skillet heat vegetable oil over medium high heat. Place a corn tortilla in the oil for 1 to 2 seconds on either side to soften. Repeat with all of the tortillas (if possible, have someone help you do this). Place tortillas on paper towel to soak up some of the oil.



Put 1 tablespoon of the chicken mixture in the center of a tortilla and sprinkle some cheese on top. Roll up tortilla and place on a lightly greased cookie sheet, seam side down. Repeat with all of the tortillas until chicken mixture is gone. If there is any cheese left over, sprinkle it over the rolled tortillas.

Bake tortillas in the preheated oven for 15 to 25 minutes or until tortillas are a little crispy and golden brown. http://allrecipes.com

Patriot Day falls on 11th September (also commonly known as 'Nine-Eleven') and is remembered globally as the anniversary of the catastrophic terrorist attacks on the USA of 11th September 2001.

Embedded in the memories of everyone who lived through it, this was the day four jet planes were hijacked and crashed into the New York World Trade Center and the Pentagon in Arlington, Virginia, causing the deaths of 2,977 people. The fourth plane (United Airlines Flight 93) was directed at Washington DC, but its passengers bravely attempted to take back control and it crashed into a field near Shanksville, Pennsylvania.

The large majority of those lost after the attacks on the Twin Towers were working at or above the points of collision; thousands of people who had gone to work that morning like every other day, found themselves suddenly stranded at the top of a burning skyscraper. A number made the choice to jump from the flaming buildings rather than wait to be caught by the flames or for the building to collapse. No one could forget the terrifying and heartbreaking stories and images captured by the news footage of the day.

In the wake of the World Trade Center collisions, many brave men and women from the emergency services risked their lives to try to help rescue victims of the attacks, and of them 411 lost their own lives attempting to fight fires and rescue people.

Patriot Day is recognized by US law as the official day of remembrance for these tragic events, and has been observed every year since. Each year on this day, American flags are flown at half-staff to honour and commemorate those lives lost. The US President asks fellow Americans to observe a moment of silence at 8.46am (Eastern Daylight Time), the time of the first plane collision into the North Tower of the World Trade Center.

While the events took place within the USA, the shock and grief experienced in response to the attacks was shared across the globe, and for this reason Patriot Day will be observed not only in America, but all over the world. *www.daysoftheyear.com*
