Technology makes our lives easier, but increases our exposure to potential identity theft with 44% of all fraud involving an online transaction (Javelin Strategy & Research). Events such as credit card takeover, unauthorized purchases, and new account openings easily come to mind. But fraudsters also misuse your online accounts like Amazon, eBay, PayPal, bank accounts, and e-mail. Furthermore, fraudsters can take out loans in your name (think mortgages and payday loans), use your name when arrested, add new properties to your utility accounts, take over your mobile phone accounts, steal your children's social security numbers, withdraw and take over your investment accounts, change direct deposits to their own bank account, sell your personal information on the black market, file fraudulent tax returns on your behalf to get your tax refund and engage in other forms of illegal but opportunistic behavior. As technology evolves, so will fraudsters. When it comes to your identity, Frontier believes it is better to be proactive than reactive.

#### **Current Action Items**

1. Consider purchasing identity theft protection. Consider hiring companies such as LifeLock, Inc. or IdentityForce™. These types of companies are charged with detecting, alerting and restoring your identity. This often includes monitoring all three

credit agencies, bank accounts, credit cards, e-mail addresses, medical insurance account numbers, phone numbers, and social security numbers. Privacy protection typically includes fraud alerts, threat alerts, junk mail opt outs, monitoring service for public records, pay day loans, court records, sex offender registry, and change of address. Black market website surveillance is often included to query if your personal information is out there. Many companies offer identity theft insurance and lost wallet assistance. Each company offers several levels of protection you can select for fees ranging from \$10 per month to \$30 per month per individual. Monitoring your children's personal information is usually an additional charge. Frontier does not endorse a specific identity theft company. You should have your own discussion with any potential identity theft company to understand the services offered, cost and history of the company you may be engaging.

2. Do what you can proactively. Your credit: Monitor your credit reports every four months and stagger these requests from one bureau to the next. Close any unauthorized accounts that appear on your credit report. Your credit cards: Sign up via your credit card provider for free fraud alerts. Most credit cards do not hold you responsible for fraudulent purchases. Some credit card providers offer more robust protection than just fraud alerts free of charge. What is offered depends on the type of card you hold with the bank so to find out you should call. Also, see if your bank offers credit cards with a chip called Europay, MasterCard and Visa (EMV). An EMV chip stores credit card account data that creates a unique transaction code every time an EMV card is used for payment. With magnetic strips the data does not change so counterfeiters duplicate your card and

spend repeatedly until you or your bank put a freeze on your account. Make a list: Make a list of all your bank, credit, utility and service accounts.

- 3. React quickly if you are a victim. Step One: Download Texas' Identity Theft Victim's Kit from the Office of the Attorney General for step-by-step guidance. Step Two: Immediately close all affected accounts. Step Three: Place a fraud alert on your credit file which prompts lenders to more carefully verify applicants. Step Four: Report the crime to your local law enforcement and request a copy of the police report. Report identity theft crime to the Federal Trade Commission and complete their ID Theft Affidavit. Contact other relevant law enforcement or government agencies. Step Five: Continue monitoring your credit report. Step Six: Complete the Application Requesting Declaration that Applicant is a Victim of Identity Theft and file it with a Texas state district court.
- 4. Don't forget your children. Texas recently passed a law mandating that credit agencies place a security freeze on minor's accounts if contacted by the minor's representative. A minor is defined as someone under the age of 16 in this regard. If these agencies do not have a consumer file for the minor, the agencies must create a record and subsequently place the security freeze on the record within a given time frame. The agencies can charge up to \$10 for each placement or removal of a freeze except under certain circumstances.

#### Treats Not Tricks

- Insist that your children postpone nibbling on any treats until they return home. To reduce their urge to munch more, serve dinner before they head out to trick-or-treat.
- When your children return home, carefully inspect all treats. Discard any candy or other food items with a torn or missing wrapper. Homemade cookies, sweets, and fruit should

- only be kept if you know and trust the person who gave them to your child.
- As an extra precaution, all fruit should be washed and sliced before eating.

#### Dressing Up

- Make sure your child's costume fits properly. The bottom end should be mid-calf or shorter to keep your child from tripping.
- Keep your child's vision clear. If your youngster insists on wearing a mask, be sure it allows ample room for breathing and seeing. Wigs and hats also can be a problem if not adequately secured.
- If possible, agree on a costume that is flame proof and flame resistant. Avoid any with overly long sleeves, scarves, or long belts that could dangle and catch fire in a jack-
- o'-lantern's candle.
- Add bright or light touches to your child's costume so that your youngster is more visible to others.
- Accessories such as broomsticks and swords can add to a child's sense of make- believe, but they can become cumbersome and can cause your child to trip. Instead, have your child leave them at home for pretend play around the house.

#### **Door to Door and More**

Every trick-or-treater should follow these rules:

- Carry a flashlight.
- Only visit homes or apartments of people you know.
- Do not enter any homes without the permission of your parents.
- Only visit those streets with which you are familiar.
- Stay away from homes or doorways that are dark.
- Keep to sidewalks and crosswalks.
- Avoid cutting across lawns.

If you allow your child to head out with friends, without your supervision, the following rules should also apply:

- An agreed upon route should be followed.
- He or she should return home at a time determined in advance.
- For safety's sake, give your youngster some pocket change so that he or she can make an emergency phone call if necessary.
- For many preschoolers or elementary school children, a viable alternative to door to door trick-or-treating is a private Halloween party. Join with neighbors, family, church, or school groups to plan a gathering that includes a costume parade, games, and of course, lots of treats to take home.

Saving for retirement doesn't need to be complicated or painful. Check out these tips on how 401(k) savings plans work and take advantage of the savings offered by your employer.

- 1. Start participating in your employer sponsored plan now: Time is on your side. The sooner you start contributing to a 401(k), the longer your money has to grow. Even if you only contribute 2 or 3 percent, it's a start.
- 2. Know your rights: By law, you are eligible to start contributing to a 401(k) plan after one year of service; your employer can't make you wait longer than that.
- 3. Pay yourself first: Out of sight, out of mind. Your contributions are taken directly out of your paycheck and deposited straight into your 401(k) plan.



- 4. Contribute to the max: It's simple, but true. The more money you put in a 401(k) plan, the faster it will grow. Participants can contribute up to maximum of \$11,000 annually, although some company plans limit the contribution to a percentage of your salary. These plans are portable and can be rolled over into an IRA or to another 401(k) if you change jobs.
- 5. Free money: Many employers offer matching contributions. Take advantage! It's like a tax-free raise.
- 6. Pre-tax benefits: 401(k) contributions are not taxed until you pull your money out. Saving pre-tax gives you more money to invest. Because taxes take a large bite out of each dollar you earn, you have to save more after-tax

dollars to get the same impact as pre-tax saving. Plus, saving pretax dollars lowers your taxable income, which means you'll pay less to the IRS.

- 7. Keep your hands off your retirement savings: Financial advisers warn against borrowing from your 401(k), even if it's to get rid of credit card debt. Essentially, you're robbing your retirement. If you do borrow, the loan has to be paid back in five years or you will be slapped with a 10-percent penalty. Plus, in most cases, if you leave your job, you'll also pay the penalties and tax unless you repay the loan in full.
- 8. Be flexible and look long-term: As the years go by, life changes; so should your retirement savings strategy. Review your 401(k) plan quarterly, and definitely annually to ensure it still meets your needs as retirement approaches.


## **Read Your Own Water Meter**

If high water bills are getting you down, it is a great time to learn to read your own meter. Your water meter is usually located near the street or sidewalk in front of your house. Some water meter boxes require a key to open, which you can buy from any local hardware or improvement store. If you are not sure what key you need, just take a picture of your water meter cover and take it to the store with you.

In Grand Prairie your water is measured by TGAL (thousand gallons). Your water system is always under pressure. When you turn on a spigot, water already in the pipe flows out, and an equivalent amount of water flows from the city water pipes through your meter. As the water flows through the meter the dials on your water meter turn, much like the odometer on your car. Your water meter has a 7 digit dial, and a sweep hand that turns as water flows through it, and a small red circle that detects low water flow (leaks).

1. Check your water bill to determine the date

of the last time that your meter was read by the city. Take note of the last reading on the bill.



3. To get your usage, subtract the previous reading from the current reading. In Grand Prairie they round down to the "thousand gallon" digit. They drop the last 3 digits, so there is anywhere from 1 to 999 gallons that won't be billed until the thousand gallon dial turns.

4. Visit the Grand Prairie Water Rates page: http://www.gptx.org/index.aspx?page=473 to figure out the amount you will be charged. Every month you are charged a meter charge for both water and waste water in addition to the water that you actually used. Your waste water is determined by your WMA (winter month





average). Your bill also includes storm water drainage and trash and recycling. Each charge is itemized on your bill.

If all of the water on your property is turned off, but the sweep hand is moving and/or the leak detector dial is spinning, you have a leak. If you have a very slow leak, you may not see it move. Take a picture of where the dial is at, and wait 30 minutes to an hour to see if the sweep hand moves slightly. If you suspect a leak, you can then take steps to isolate it. Check for sprinkler system leaks, running toilets, and dripping faucets

To verify the accuracy of your water meter, fill up a 5 gallon bucket with water and verify that the meter only advances 5 gallons. To figure out where you can conserve water, start looking at your meter every time you do laundry, or shower, or use substantial water. Once you see how much you are using, you can figure out ways to conserve.

# Timely Tips for October Gardeners

Usher in the autumn season with creative displays for indoors and out! Transformation quickly occurs with pots of mums, pansies, cabbages and ornamental peppers when combined with pumpkins, gourds and bales of hay. Create a spectacular vignette in your landscape with bales of hay, a scarecrow or two, multiple sizes of pumpkins and gourds, pots of garden mums, corn stalks and for more texture consider adding old tools, a set of antlers or birdhouses. The autumn color palette offers a myriad of wonderful colors from which to choose; purples, rusts, gold's, yellows, oranges, deep greens and browns can be used. Whether you are mixing colors or working with only one,

use color abundantly to create massive appeal. Create a pyramid of pumpkins and gourds by selecting different colors and stacking them one on top of the other. Simply displaying a "pile" of pumpkins in the same color palette and different sizes will draw ones eye and interest to an area of your landscape.

Color Creations filled with blooming or colorful foliage plants can be used on patios and porches. Freshen up existing containers by nestling an interesting pumpkin or gourd in amongst the plants. Fill a favorite basket or pot with a mixture of produce for a simple, impressive look. Add a bit of nature into your containers with

branches, corn husks, berries and other materials to enhance the overall look. If you did not apply a pre-emergent herbicide to your lawn in September; apply it by the first two weeks of October. You should also fertilize your St. Augustine or Bermuda lawns no later than the first week of October.

October is bulb buying month. They are in fresh supply and will provide welcome late winter and early spring color for the landscape. Refrigerate Tulips and Hyacinth bulb for at least 45 to 60 days to provide enough chilling to bloom properly. Plant them in late November or early December.

### **Making Any Changes? Don't Forget To Obtain Approval First!**

### We're confident you'll recognize our community while reading these principles.

- 1. Associations ensure that the collective rights and interests of homeowners are respected and preserved.
- 2. Associations are the most local form of representative democracy, with leaders elected by their neighbors to govern in the best interest of all residents.
- 3. Associations provide services and amenities to residents, protect property values and meet the established expectations of homeowners.
- 4. Associations succeed when they cultivate a true sense of community, active homeowner involvement and a culture of building consensus.
- 5. Association homeowners have the right to elect their community leaders and to use the democratic process to determine the policies that will protect their investments.
- 6. Association homeowners choose where to live and accept a contractual responsibility to abide by established policies and meet their financial obligations to the association.
- 7. Association leaders protect the community's financial health by using established management practices and sound business principles.
- 8. Association leaders have a legal and ethical obligation to adhere to the association's governing documents and abide by all applicable laws.
- 9. Association leaders seek an effective balance between the preferences of individual residents and the collective rights of homeowners.
- 10. Association leaders and residents should be reasonable, flexible and open to the possibility—and benefits—of compromise.
