



A Reminder That We All Can Just Get Along The Key is Communication!



It's often the best way to prevent and resolve conflict before it reaches the legal system. You don't have to be friends or spend time together to achieve a peaceful coexistence, but you should try to be a good neighbor and follow these tips:

- **Say hello.** At the mailbox, while walking the dog or when you see a moving van arrive, introduce yourself. Learn your neighbors' names and regularly offer a friendly greeting.
- Provide a heads up. If you're planning a construction project, altering your landscaping or hosting a big party, contact your neighbors beforehand.

- Do unto others. Treat neighbors as you would like to be treated. Be considerate about noise from vehicles, stereos, pets, etc.
- Know your differences. Make an effort to understand each other. Differences in age, ethnic background and years in the neighborhood can lead to different expectations or misunderstandings.
- Consider the view. Keep areas of your property that others can see presentable.
- Appreciate them. If the neighbors do something you like, let them know. They'll be pleased you noticed, and it'll be easier to talk later if they do something you don't like.
- Stay positive. Most people don't try to create problems. If a neighbor does something that irritates you, don't assume it was deliberate.
- **Talk honestly.** Tolerance is important, but don't let a real irritation go because it seems unimportant or hard to discuss. Let your neighbors know if something they do annoys.
- Be respectful. Talk directly to your neighbors if there's a problem. Gossiping with others can damage relationships and create trouble.
- Remain calm. If a neighbor mentions a problem they have with you, thank them for the input. You don't have to agree or justify any behavior. Wait for any anger to subside before responding.
- **Listen carefully.** When discussing a problem, try to understand your neighbor's position and why he or she feels that way.
- Take your time. Take a break to think about what you and your neighbor have discussed. Arrange to finish the conversation at another time.

SHAMROCK PRETZEL POPS

Ingredients

- Mini pretzel twists
- · Green chocolate melts
- Decorations (green M&Ms and green sprinkles)
- Equipment:
- Cake pop sticks
- Wax paper
- · Baking sheet
- Fork
- Spoon (to stir the green chocolate melts)

Instructions

- Place green chocolate melts in a microwavable bowl and put it in the microwave, setting the timer for 30 second increments at 50% power, stirring every 30 second interval.
- 2. While the green chocolate is melting, line your baking sheet with wax paper. Gather the rest of your ingredients needed to make one shamrock pretzel pop. You'll need one cake pop stick, three mini pretzel twists, one green M&M, and green sprinkles.
- 3. Once the green chocolate is completely melted, now it's time to dip the pretzels and align them on the wax paper. BIG TIP:

- MOVE QUICKLY!! The chocolate tends to set if not touched after a few minutes so you'll want to dip, arrange, and decorate your shamrock pretzel pop in a timely manner.
- 4. Working with one pretzel at a time, drop one pretzel in the green chocolate. Use your fork to move the pretzel around, making sure it is evenly coated.
- 5. Get your fork underneath your pretzel and tap the fork on the rim of the bowl to allow all excess green chocolate to drip back into the bowl. This may take a few seconds.
- 6. Bring your fork over to the wax lined baking sheet and gently lay your pretzel down.
- 7. Repeat the dipping process with the second and third pretzels, arranging them in the shape of a shamrock when laying them down. Make sure to leave a little space in between the left and right pretzels for the cake pop stick.
- 8. Dip the tip of the cake pop stick into the green chocolate (I tend to dip about an inch). Wedge the dipped tip in between the left and the right pretzel, making sure it's also touching the pretzel on top.



- Carefully place an M&M in the center, connecting all three pretzels. Decorate your shamrock with green sprinkles.
- 10. Allow the green chocolate on the pretzels to set completely before removing from the wax paper. Once the chocolate has hardened, carefully peel your shamrock pretzel pop from the wax paper and ta-da!

Keep your backyard bug free - naturally.



Summer is the time for barbecue parties and sleeping under the stars, but bothersome bugs can ruin outdoor fun. Many people spray themselves and their lawns with chemical repellants to get rid of these pests, but there are natural alternatives that are environmentally friendly to your home and our association. Here are a few tips to help you enjoy a bug-free summer.

Get growing. Planting a simple garden can do wonders in keeping the bug count down. Plants like garlic, radishes, marigolds, nasturtium, oregano, sage, rosemary, cilantro and mint are easy to cultivate and can make the area in and around your garden uninviting to the creepy crawlers, as they act as natural bug repellants. Pest-control never looked or tasted so good!

Wet and wild. Eliminate stagnate or standing water in your yard; it provides breeding grounds for mosquitoes. Emptying used kiddy pools and fountains and refilling them with fresh water, cleaning gutters of leaves and other rain-blocking debris and filling in puddles with dirt are just some of the ways to reduce the buzzing bugs in your yard.

Going to the birds. Setting up a few bird houses in your yard is not only a great way to enjoy the beauty of our feathered friends, but it also mitigates bug problems, since many birds love to dine on dragonflies, dung beetles and the ilk.

Candle in the wind. When outdoors, ignite an all-natural bug repellant candle nearby to keep the bugs at bay, and enjoy the sweet smell of citronella, lavender, mint and other aromas that pests find repugnant. Brands such as BioSensory, Solay, Melo and Yankee Candle have jumped onto the debugging bandwagon and offer ecoconscious candles.

Light up the night. Many high-flying insects are drawn to light like a moth to the...you get the idea. So, why not install an elevated yellow bug light on your back porch or deck to attract those critters up and away from the ground (and you!) when you spend an evening outdoors. Of course, be sure to review our CC&Rs or talk with to an association representative to make sure your bug lights are in compliance with our rules.

What Are CC&Rs Anyway???

When our community was developed, the developer filed with the state a series of documents designed to uphold the integrity of our community and spell out the duties of our association, and the responsibilities of each of us, the owners. Those documents are often referred to as the governing documents are made up of the Articles of Incorporation, the Bylaws, and the CC&R's (Conditions, Covenants & Restrictions).

The Articles of Incorporation are a one-page document that must be filed with the Secretary of State. It simply states that a non-profit corporation is being formed (our community association).

The Bylaws dictate the powers and duties of the Board of Directors (when meetings occur, how the Board is elected, etc.)

The CC&R's dictate the powers and duties of the corporation and regulate both the physical characteristics of our development and the lifestyles of our residents.

Of all of the governing documents, the CC&R's are often the least understood but inarguably the most important.

In order to close escrow on your home, you signed a series of papers, one of which stated that you had read the CC&R's and agree to abide by them. When escrow closed, you entered in to a contractual agreement with the other owners in our community to conform to the dictates of those CC&R's. This is where some owners get confused. The confusion, however, is easily cleared up once the CC&R's are read, or re-read as the case may be. After all, how many of you actually read and understood the CC&R's before closing escrow? Those that did are to be applauded. The rest of us have had to take a crash-course on the CC&R's through trial and error. Often we have found out that we are in non-compliance to the CC&R's or Rules & Regulations through correspondence received by our management company. So, we dust off that old copy of the CC&R's (it took me half a day to remember where it was) and, sure enough, there it is in black and white, the exact restriction that we completely forgot about. Being responsible owners we correct the situation and, armed with a new-found knowledge of our

CC&R's, we continue with our lives, undisturbed (that is, until we "forget" something else and have to go through the process once again).

Often we focus on the "pain in the neck" aspect of our CC&R's, but by doing so we miss the real beauty of their purpose. The CC&R's provide a structural framework to help residents of different backgrounds, ideals, and perceptions to live together in harmony and by doing so, the community and our property values benefit.

If we had no architectural controls (as spelled out in the CC&R's) or no ability to correct violations of the Rules & Regulations (also spelled out in the CC&R's), then there would be no harmony and ultimately our community and our property values would suffer. In other words, the CC&R's are good business...they help ensure that our property values are maintained and our investments protected.


Example: What would the impact on your property values be if your neighbor decided to repair automobiles in his parking area as a parttime job and decided to advertise with a big sign he nailed to the roof of his building? Furthermore, in order to attract attention to the sign, he painted his building bright red. This example may be a little over the top, but it applies equally to the neighbor who doesn't maintain his/her living area. The bottom line is that your property values would suffer. No one would want to buy your home and have to live next to such "chaos". Since market values are affected by the law of supply and demand, if the demand (or attractiveness) of your community is poor, then the supply (or cost) is reduced. When the demand is high (the community is aesthetically attractive) then the supply (or property values) are increased. The CC&R's promote conformity, which encourages harmony, which has a positive impact on the value of our community.

So, the next time you get a note from the management company explaining why you are in non-compliance with the CC&R's or the Rules & Regulations, take a moment to remember what the spirit of the CC&R's embrace (protection of your investment) and be thankful that our Board of Directors are taking their job seriously and are working to protect, preserve and enhance our property values.

Garden

March is a good time to start planning lawn and gardening projects. By April 1 in North Texas, we should be safe from late season freezes. If you haven't already started planting, now is the time to get inspired and make

- Put down pre-emergent herbicide Late February or early March to prevent last year's weed seeds from sprouting.
- Remove all dead vegetation from gardens.
- Sow vegetable and flower seeds or plant bedding plants. Be prepared to protect them in case of a late freeze. You can use the planting containers inverted over the plant, but be sure to remove as soon as temps are above
- Plant summer flowering bulbs, perennial flowers shrubs and trees.
- Fertilize existing trees with fertilizer spikes around the drip line of the
- Once grass starts to green up, mow to remove some of the dead grass, and fertilize with a balanced lawn fertilizer. Aerate lawn if soil is compacted. If needed use Broadleaf weed killer on lawn, but avoid getting it on desirable plants and trees.
- Add compost to garden soil and work it into the soil.
- Lightly prune trees to raise the canopy height, and remove diseased and crossing branches before it gets too hot.
- It is a great time to audit your sprinkler system by checking your controller settings and looking for leaks before letting it run on auto pilot. One inch of water per week is ideal for lawn, plants and trees. April and May is also thunderstorm season. If Mother Nature doesn't provide enough rain, be sure to supplement with your sprinklers, so that plants develop a strong root system heading into summer.
- Lawn maintenance and gardening chores are great exercise that costs much less than a gym membership, and it also increases your property value. Plan your work, work your plan and then sit back and enjoy the beauty!
