

Lollipop Valentine's Cookies

Ingredients:

- 12 craft sticks
- 1/2 cup semisweet chocolate chips
- 1/2 cup butter, softened
- 1/3 cup packed light brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 egg
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/4 cup unsweetened cocoa powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 12 (1 ounce) squares white chocolate
- 1 egg white
- 1 1/4 cups confectioners' sugar
- 3 drops red food coloring

Directions:

Bring sugar, butter and eggnog 1. Soak craft sticks for one hour in a bowl of cold water.

- 2. In small heavy saucepan over very low heat, stir chocolate chips until melted and smooth. Remove from heat; let cool.
- 3. In large bowl with electric mixer at medium speed, beat butter, brown sugar and vanilla until fluffy. Beat egg in well; beat in cooled chocolate. With mixer at low speed, beat in flour, cocoa powder and salt until smooth. Divide dough in half.
- 4. Preheat oven to 375 degrees F (190 degrees C) and grease 2 large cookie sheets.
- 5. Roll each half out to 1/8 inch thickness between 2 sheets of wax paper; freeze, in wax paper, 5 min-

utes. Peal top sheets of wax paper off dough; cut dough out using 3-inch heart-shaped cutter. Reroll scraps; freeze again 5 minutes; cut out. Place half of the hearts 1 inch apart on prepared cookie sheet.

- 6. Drain sticks, pat dry. Place one stick on each heart to make 2 1/2 inch handle, pressing lightly into dough. Place remaining hearts on top; press edges gently to seal. Bake about 12 minutes until firm to touch. Cool on wire racks.
- 7. In 2-quart heavy saucepan over very low heat, or in top of double boiler set over barely simmering water, stir white or milk chocolate until melted and smooth; if using both chocolates, melt in separate 1-quart pans. Remove from heat.
- 8. Holding each lollipop by handle, dip into chocolate to coat on both sides; let excess chocolate drip back into pan. Place each lollipop as it is coated on wax-paper-lined cookie sheet; refrigerate 20 minutes until chocolate is set.
- 9. To Make Icing: In large bowl with electric mixer at high speed, beat egg white and confectioners' sugar until very smooth. If desired, remove small portion of icing to separate bowl; tint with drops of food coloring. Spoon icing into decorating bag fitted with small writing tip; pipe over lollipops in desired patterns. Decorate with assorted candies and decors; attaching with dots of icing.








Mira Lagos Tree Requirements

Mira Lagos CC&Rs Section 4.16 Landscaping. At a minimum, the landscaping for each Lot shall consist of a fully sodded front yard and a fully grassed side yard on the street side of each corner lot and the planting of **two trees** that are a minimum of **3 inches caliper** in the front yard of each lot between the building set back line and the sidewalk or in the front parkway between the sidewalk and the curb. Landscaping shall be place within thirty (30) days after the main residence is occupied. (The HOA is currently working on revising this particular section of the documents as some of the yards are too small to equip 2 growing trees- please check with the onsite office for details.)













Mardi Gras or Fat Tuesday February 28, 2017

Mardi Gras or Fat Tuesday, in English, refers to events of the Carnival celebrations, beginning on or after the Christian feasts of the Epiphany, Three Kings Day, and culminating on the day before Ash Wednesday. Mardi Gras is French for "Fat Tuesday", reflecting the practice of the last night of eating richer, fatty foods before the ritual fasting of the Lenten season.

Popular practices on Mardi Gras include wearing masks and costumes, overturning social conventions, dancing, sports competitions, parades, etc. Similar expressions to Mardi Gras appear in other European languages sharing the Christian tradition, as it is associated with the religious requirement for confession before Lent begins.

The festival season varies from city to city, as some traditions, such as the one in New Orleans, Louisiana, consider Mardi Gras to stretch the entire period from Twelfth Night (the last night of Christmas which begins Epiphany) to Ash Wednesday. Others treat the final three-day period before Ash Wednesday as the Mardi Gras.

Mardi Gras in the United States

Many historians believe that the first American Mardi Gras took

place on March 3, 1699, when the French explorers Iberville and Bienville landed in what is now Louisiana, just south of the holiday's future epicenter: New Orleans. They held a small celebration and dubbed the spot Point du Mardi Gras. In the decades that followed, New Orleans and other French settlements began



marking the holiday with street parties, masked balls and lavish dinners. When the Spanish took control of New Orleans, however, they abolished these rowdy rituals, and the bans remained in force until Louisiana became a U.S. state in 1812.

On Mardi Gras in 1827, a group of students donned colorful costumes and danced through the streets of New Orleans, emulating the revelry they'd observed while visiting Paris. Ten years later, the first recorded New Orleans Mardi Gras parade took place, a tradition that continues to this day. In 1857, a secret society of New Orleans businessmen called the Mistick Krewe of Comus organized a torch-lit Mardi Gras procession with marching bands and rolling floats, setting the tone for future public celebrations in the city. Since then, krewes have remained a fixture of the Carnival scene throughout Louisiana. Other lasting customs include throwing beads and other trinkets, wearing masks, decorating floats and eating King Cake.



February is responsible pet owner month, owning a pet is not just a privilege it's a responsibility. This is a good time to think about the importance of getting your pet spayed or neutered and to schedule a check-up with your veterinarian. Here are a few tips and guidelines that all pet owners should live by:

- Make them part of the family. Pets, especially dogs need companionship.
- Pet proof your house. Make sure your household products and food that can harm pets is in a safe location.
- Regular visits to the veterinarian and groomer.
- Spay or neuter your pet. Studies have shown that pets that are spayed or neutered live healthier, longer lives and are less likely to develop behavior problems.
- Always keep and ID tag on your pet. Also, consider getting your pet microchipped to identify him if he is lost or stolen.
- Train your pet. Dogs should at least understand basic direction like "sit" and "stay".
- Give them the exercise they need. All pets need regular exercise to stay fit and release their energy.
- Feed them properly. Keep your pet on a regular portion controlled diet will help manage weight and prevent health problems.
- Socialize your pet. Meeting new people and other pets improves the confidence of your pet.
- Love your pet. You are your pet's favorite thing in the world. They crave your love and attention. So show your pet the love and devotion he shows you.



February 4 Rosa Parks Day





Rosa Louise McCauley Parks was born February 4, 1913 in Alabama. Rosa was an American civil rights activist and leader whom the United States Congress called "the first lady of civil rights" and "the mother of the freedom movement". On

December 1st 1955, Rosa Parks refused to move to the back of the bus and stood up against segregation. Her refusal to surrender her seat to a white passenger on a Montgomery, Alabama bus spurred a city-wide boycott. The city of Montgomery had no choice but to lift the law requiring segregation on public buses. Rosa Parks received many accolades during her lifetime, including the NAACP's highest award

Thurgood Marshall



Thurgood Marshall was born in Baltimore, Maryland July 2, 1908 and served as legal counsel for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP)and was an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States, serving from October 1967 until October 1991. Marshall was the Court's 96th justice and its first African-American justice.

Before becoming a judge, Marshall was a lawyer who was best known for his high success rate in arguing before the Supreme Court and for the victory in Brown v. Board of Education, a decision that desegregated public schools. He served on the United States Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit after being appointed by President John F. Kennedy and then served as the Solicitor General after being appointed by President Lyndon Johnson in 1965. President Johnson nominated him to the United States Supreme Court in 1967.



For a lovely landscape, treat your lawn with **pre-emergent** around Valentine's Day to help with weed control in the spring.



Everyone likes a tax break, and you may be in line to get one. If you have already received your assessment notice, you may have to wait for next year. But there are still ways that you can lower your property taxes for this year. Keep reading!

#1: Appeal Property Assessments

Think about this revealing fact: between 30% and 60% of homeowners are paying a higher property tax rate than they should because of a bad property assessment. Yet only 1 in 10 homeowners ever contest that assessment. Pull together information comparing your property to similar properties in your neighborhood. (A real estate agent may be able to help you with this.) Once you compare your rate to what others around you are paying, you will have a good idea about whether your assessment is wrong. However, any improvements you have made since your last assessment will cause your property taxes to go up. Also, take a look at your property card by going down to your assessor's office to check for errors. Keep this in mind: up to 40% of homeowners who challenge their assessments win!

#2: Tax Credits for Certain Improvements (Think Green)

An indirect way to reduce your property taxes is to offset them with tax credits. You would be amazed at how much money homeowners leave with the IRS at the end of each year simply because they did not claim all of the credits due to them.

If you make certain improvements to your home that fall into one of these categories, you could offset your property taxes by hundreds if not thousands of dollars. Here are three homeowner tax credits available to you:

- Home Improvement Loan Interest. Any home improvement loan of \$100,000 or less is tax deductible.
- Energy-Efficiency Tax Credit. Simple improvements like installing new efficient windows, HVAC, insulation, or storm doors can account for up to \$500 in tax credits.
- Renewable Energy Tax Credit. Green improvements like installing solar panels that supply your home with energy gives you a tax credit of 30% of your costs for buying and installing. These tax breaks may change frequently, so consult a tax professional to discuss what is available to you.

#3: Take Advantage of Tax Breaks

Finally, in addition to these measures, standard run-of-the-mill tax breaks can save you a lot of money. You need to bone up on the different credits afforded to you as a homeowner. Talk to a tax professional about shielding part of your home valuation from taxes. Ask what credits are available to you as a senior or a veteran. Regular mortgage deductions added up to close to \$2,000 in 2012.

Every locality is different, and some cities and states may offer additional tax breaks and property tax reductions that are not listed here. Check with your local county clerk's office or talk to a tax professional about more ways to reduce your property taxes.



Start planning for a beautiful spring landscape now. In North Texas the weather is variable, but we almost always get some nice days to work in the yard and cure your gardening spring fever!

- Put pre-emergent on your lawn to prevent cool season grassy weeds from sprouting.
- Prune Trees, Roses, and Shrubs
- Clean up leaves and any dead plant material
- Prune crepe myrtle seed pods, but don't top them (Crepe Murder)
- Plant bare root perennials and summer flowering bulbs as soon as ground is workable
- Best time to fertilize trees
- Once freezing weather has passed cut lawn to stimulate growth
- Inspect sprinkler system for leaks and time settings
- Sprinklers can still be in the off position and only water when there is a shortage of rain.
- Please conserve water whenever possible

Grand Prairie Snap & Send!

Grand Prairie residents using the city's new "Snap and Send" app can now report issues, such as street light outages and code violations, using their smartphones. The app, currently compatible with iPhone, iPad and iPod touch, allows users to specify the location of an issue and attach a photo to send directly to city staff as well as track the status of their service requests.

Search "Snap and Send Grand Prairie TX" in the Apple App Store and download for free. The city plans to make the app available for Android users in the future.
